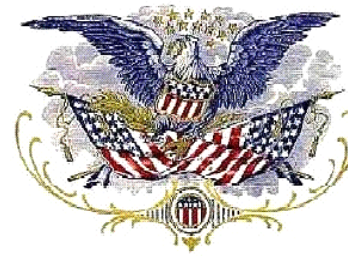

MANUAL FOR ARMY COOKS.

N. B.—In washing any greasy utensil, it is best, if possible, to use the hand instead of flannel or rags, as they retain the grease, and so keep putting it on again, instead of scrubbing it off.

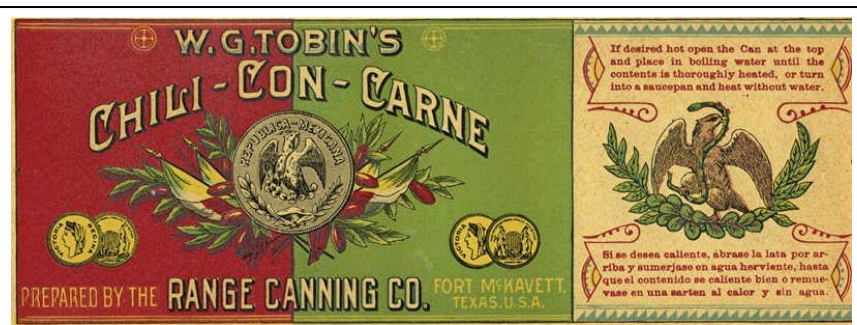
All utensils after being used should be at once filled with hot water and set over the fire to scald thoroughly, and before being set away should be cleaned and dried. Grease remaining in a vessel will make it rancid, and moisture will rust it.



*We have seen these all over the Fort McKavett area,
 but do you know the story behind them?*

In the early 1890's, Colonel William Leslie Black, a rancher from Fort McKavett, Texas, set out to thin out his overgrown stock of Angora goats. Deciding there was money to be made by selling the meat, Black created the Range Canning Company, one of West Texas' first meat-packing firms. The general public was not ready for goat meat, thus Black purchased some four-color labels and called his product "Roast Mutton." The Colonel found it difficult in selling his Roast Mutton, and ordered new labels entitled "Boiled Mutton" – See the labels at the top and bottom of this page. Around this time, Black hired W.G. Tobin from a Chicago meat packing firm to oversee his canning operation. The repackaging as "Boiled Mutton" failed and Black again changed the label, this time to "W. G. Tobin's Chili-Con-Carne. These mislabeled cans were marketed in Europe to much success.

Of course, one of the problems they had in selling these products in the United States was the miss-labeling. Was it goat or sheep people were buying?



Another Area Attraction



The Next time you come to the Fort, take a little side trip and go by the Presidio de San Saba at Menard. Texas Tech has been doing archeological work over the last few years and have found quite a bit of the original Spanish Fort.

Originally known as Presidio San Luis de las Amarillas, it was constructed in April of 1757 by a Spanish force led by Captain Don Diego Ortiz Parilla. One of the main reasons for the Presidio was the protection of Mission San Saba. But the Priests decided it was to be built 3 miles from the Mission. When the mission was destroyed by Indians in 1758, the soldiers could not protect them because of the distance. The presidio was abandoned in 1772 by order of the Viceroy of New Spain.

The Texas Centennial Commission rebuilt part of the Presidio during the mid-1930's. It is well worth seeing.

Troopers from Fort McKavett used the ruins and grounds to camp on as they came through the area between 1852 and 1883.

Menard County owns the site and there are no admission charges. Be sure to bring your camera.

Meet the Soldiers at McKavett

Surgeon Middleton was on duty at Fort McKavett from March 1868 to November 1868. His office was located in the Old Hospital ruins in front of the 1875 building. He arrived with Company "A" of the 4th Cavalry and left when he was transferred to Austin Headquarters in November. He later transferred to Washington D.C. with his wife Margaret.
