Army Recipes

Chili con Carne.

92. For 50 men, take 12½ pounds of meat (scraps) and cut into pieces about ½ inch cube. Place in a bake-pan and fry in the same manner as beefsteak, but using a smaller amount of fat. (All fat should have been trimmed from the meat before cutting up.) Place the meat (fried) in a bake-pan and cover about 1 inch with beef stock; add 3 ounces of ground Chili peppers and salt to taste; let simmer until the meat is thoroughly done. Take 2 quarts of baked beans and pass through a meat-cutter and mix well in the chili con carne; then add 1 quart of beans whole. When ready to serve, there should be sufficient beef stock to just cover the preparation. While cooking it may be necessary to add beef stock to replace that lost by evaporation.

Rice Pudding.

123. For 50 men, boil 3 Government tin cups of rice rapidly in water; strain through a sieve; add to each cup of rice 3 eggs, well whipped. To each 3 cups of rice add 1 can of Highland cream sweetened to taste, and a small amount of extract added. Salt slightly; mix well with sugar and add water so as to cover about ½ inch. Bake slowly in the oven until slightly brown. Serve with sauce. (The rice should not be over-boiled, but the kernels should remain separate and firm.)


Beef is purchased by contract at 10¢ per pound, it could be had in any quantity; the contractor drops from 20 to 40 calves from all the time, but he is not allowed to keep the calves for 30 days; the contractor loses a lot of money by this kind of contracting, as they are unaccountable to the range.

May 1st, 1857 found there was a fresh beef supply at Fort McKavett. 20-40 beeves were kept on hand at all times and a butcher was hired to take care of the herd. He was paid the princely sum of \$30.00 per month. They had a real problem with the cattle wandering off and getting lost.

Annual Fall Star Party

The Johnson Space Center Astronomical Society held the fall star party at Fort McKavett Thursday, October 7 – Sunday October 10th. 35 club members traveled to the fort. A few of them came from as far away as England and New Mexico but most of the amateur astronomers were from the Houston area. No matter how far they traveled, their efforts were rewarded with the three best nights of observing we have had in a number of years! The days were warm and sunny and the nights were cool and clear! The group was able to observe one of Jupiter's moons passing in front the planet and members were able to watch Comet Hartley traveling through the skies for three days. The beautiful weather brought a number of people to the fort for the archaeology programs during the day and 13 people attended the beginning astronomy program presented by David Haviland and Ken Lester in the school house at 6:30p.m. As the Sun set, the crowd swelled! Unfortunately, we don't have an official count but several people estimated the crowd at about 250! It was undoubtedly one of our largest turnouts. We had a large group of people from Junction, a homeschooling group from the Sonora area as well as a number of other visitors from Sonora. Lubbock, Abilene, San Angelo, and Amarillo were other towns that visitors traveled from to attend this event. Oooohs and Aaaahs and "that can't be real" were heard as the visitors looked through eye pieces at Jupiter and 4 of its moons, Comet Hartley, a Double Cluster, galaxies, globular clusters, open clusters, and nebulas. The path of red garden lights purchased by the Friends of Fort McKavett were a big success and we receive compliments on how well they worked from visitors who had attended other star parties. Many thanks to the park hosts for their help with this event.
